

Japanese culture



- It has been a tradition to have a Japanese teacher here giving the lessons to our students.
- We are happy to have Emiko at GJAR since October 2010 ⁽³⁾
- This year, apart from her afternoon classes
 Emiko came to our 1st year
 students' classes to talk about the school
 system in Japan and Geishas.

Here are some interesting facts you might be interested in:

- Most schools are very strict.
- Students wear uniforms. Everything the same, even socks, shoes or school bags.
- No make up or jewelry.
- Schools are co/educational. Some are for girls or boys only.
- No cleaners at school. Students clean everything after the lessons (toilets, gym, teachers 'rooms including).
- In the past there were 6 school days a week.
- If a student decides for any of the school clubs, they have to attend it during the weekends or holidays, too and practise for at least 3 hours.
- 40 days of summer holidays only. 2-week spring and 2-week winter holidays.
- School starts in April, and a school year has got 3 semesters.
